

Citizens Community Award

Nominees: Cynthia Delanoy-Summerwood CWG, Claudria Gromatzky, Gayle Hatala, Rhonda Jimmerson and Paula Cox



Cynthia Delanoy is the Community Watch Group Coordinator for the Summerwood Community Group who joined the APD family in 2008. Comprised of approximately 215 homes, the Summerwood Community Group has remained one of the most active groups in the South District. Cynthia has consistently been a leader within her community, serving as a Code Ranger and an active member of the Citizens On Patrol program. She is always seeking out new opportunities to become involved with the Arlington Police Department despite her busy work schedule. It is not uncommon for a Community Watch Group to lose participation after a few months. One of the ways that Cynthia keeps her neighborhood engaged is through monthly newsletters that she distributes electronically to her neighbors. It includes crime statistics as well as other helpful information, and includes a "Yard of the Month Beautification Program." Cynthia is truly "Community Policing" in action.

Business Partnership Award

Lorie Lisius is the General Manager for the **Parks Mall** and C. D. Fisher is the Security Director for **Valor Security**. Both have demonstrated their commitment to the safety of citizens who visit the Parks Mall, the largest retail destination in the City of Arlington. A state-of-the-art surveillance system at the Parks Mall has been used in the apprehension of numerous criminals involved in a range of crimes and has been beneficial to the investigation of crimes not only at the mall but in other parts of the city. Valor Security is a contract security company that handles all security issues with the Parks Mall. They work hand-in-hand with Arlington Police officers and display professionalism and a great deal of appreciation and concern for them. Due to their contributions and the strength of our working relationship with the Parks Mall and Valor Security, there has been a significant decrease in crime in the area.

Rookie Officer of the Year

After field training, **Officer Travis Rodermund** was assigned to the West District. From day one, he made an immediate impact and has not slowed down. Officer Rodermund has continued to learn and take on whatever assignment he is given with enthusiasm and dedication, whether it is enforcement or community projects. He has had some of the highest levels of self-initiated activity on his shift, making 108 arrests and issuing 413 citations. Many of these arrests have been felony suspects who were in possession of guns, drugs and stolen contraband. He also worked a total of 1375 calls for service and assisted on over 1100 calls. Officer Rodermund has demonstrated excellent investigative skills, a strong sense of teamwork, enthusiasm for his job and a quality work product, making him a consummate professional.

Detective of the Year

Throughout his years of service, **Detective Paul Balson** has shown a passion and love for his job. Known for his tenacious attitude toward combating crime, Detective Balson epitomizes the characteristics of a true Peace Officer. Recently, he demonstrated his caring attitude towards a gang member who was trying to make a change in his lifestyle. Detective Balson communicated with the young man on a regular basis, contacted several businesses to help him find a job, and assisted in helping him and his wife with needed items when he learned they were expecting their first child. Detective Balson has the ability to reach out to people and to make positive things occur, leading through his actions rather than words. As a detective in the Gang Unit, Detective Balson is frequently called on to give Gang presentations to organizations, civic events and community groups.



Operations Officer of the Year

Officer Jason Belz is a Traffic Enforcement Officer and has taken on the responsibility for overseeing the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection Program. The program is designed to monitor the roadways within the city limits of Arlington for trucks that pose both safety and hazardous conditions to all vehicular traffic. Officer Belz has taken a ten-year-old program and completely restructured it from having a handful of APD officers to officers trained throughout the Tarrant County region. He has re-engineered this program into a viable asset that has rejuvenated a new interest in traffic enforcement. His hard work has placed Arlington in the forefront in traffic enforcement and earned him the reputation as an expert in the field. Officer Belz is a leader who needs no direction and takes his responsibilities seriously. He has enhanced the Commercial Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection Program and the effects of his efforts are now being recognized as a quality program that is yielding positive results.



Community Support Officer of the Year

Officer Kimberly Fretwell joined the Crime Prevention Unit in 2009 and hit the ground running. Due to her diligence, five new community watch groups have been added to the North District. Officer Fretwell was tasked with implementing the Arlington Clergy And Police Partnership program. She was able to take Chief Bowman's vision of ACAPP and turn it into a reality that is well organized and highly respected. Officer Fretwell's loyalty to the Department, its mission, the District needs, and our residents/visitors is unmatched. She eagerly accepts challenges and welcomes each opportunity to engage the community, actively seeking innovative ways to improve the quality of life in each area of the District.



Professional Employee of the Year/Administrative

North District Officer of the Year

Officer Juan Rodriguez is a Beat Officer who is extremely aware of the challenges within his beat. This area is home to both residential and commercial properties and he does an excellent job of balancing the issues for both. He works tirelessly to combat the crime in his beat and is a wealth of knowledge which benefits everyone on his shift. Officer Rodriguez is proactive in addressing the criminal element in his area which was evident in his constructing a thoroughly detailed Burglary of a Motor Vehicle (BMV) Operations Plan. Officer Rodriguez is consistently one of the top producers for citations and arrests every month, is always productive, and completes all tasks assigned with very little supervision. Officer Rodriguez brings a good attitude with him to work every day and is very dependable and task oriented. He has the uncanny ability to make good decisions in the field and has quickly matured to the level of a veteran officer.

East District Officer of the Year

Officer Damien Gary takes his profession very seriously, always representing the department in a positive light. He consistently does the right thing at the right time for the right reason. During the past year, Officer Gary arrested more suspects for drugs, weapons and illegal money, and obtained more confessions than any other patrol officer on the East evening shift. He investigates calls fully, leaving nothing for interpretation and frequently sees beyond the arrest, investigating further. Officer Gary frequently assists officers in answering calls for service, can be counted on to produce results, and to provide intelligence to the HEAT Unit, the Gang Unit, the Foot Patrol Unit and the Narcotics Unit. He takes pride in his work, is committed to quality and leads by example.



West District Officer of the Year

Officer Jay Robinson has worked in the West District since he joined the department in 2006. He has become a leader on the evening shift and sets an example for all officers to follow, acting as a mentor and coach to new officers. Officer Robinson takes on every assignment with enthusiasm, creativity and passion. He knows the citizens and criminals alike in his sector and truly defines what a beat officer should be. An apartment complex in his beat was an open-air drug market frequented by gang members, drug dealers and drug users. Officer Robinson teamed with other officers to complete foot patrols, surveillance details, traffic enforcement, and general enforcement in and around the complex. Taking the lead on most of these activities, Officer Robinson worked with apartment management to establish an open line of communication which resulted in evictions and property clean up by Code Compliance Services. After six months, the complex had a 68% reduction in calls for service and became a better place for residents to live.



South District Officer of the Year

Officer Carla Strauser is described as a go-getter who requires little supervision and has a true desire to serve the citizens in her beat. She stays connected to her Community Watch Groups and is in contact with one or more on a daily basis, providing them with information and receiving feedback from them weekly. Officer Strauser utilizes her excellent investigative skills, even when she has not been dispatched to a call, relaying information over the radio on suspects, vehicles and call locations so other officers on the call know the history of the location and people involved. Officer Strauser has been associated with the Santa Cops Program for seven years and currently serves on the board. She always goes beyond what's expected and tries to learn which families in her beat are in need of help and goes out of her way to assist those families at Christmas through the Santa Cops Program. Her determination, tenacity, intuition and self initiative make her a valuable asset to the South District.



Officer of the Year

Selected from all officer nominees



Corporal James Garrow is assigned to the South District and makes significant contributions to the overall effectiveness of the Arlington Police Department. He regularly assists with and organizes directed patrols for traffic, foot patrols, and other types of patrols to deal with issues in his beat and sector. Corporal Garrow has a proactive approach, making other officers and sergeants aware of issues, so they can be dealt with before they become problems. He makes positive contacts with citizens and is a leader on his shift. He routinely volunteers for additional duties including maintenance and inventory of patrol vehicles while effectively handling any beat concerns. Corporal Garrow is always willing to accept responsibilities and regularly makes timely and accurate decisions with little or no supervision. He is an excellent Police Training Officer and a resource for other officers while consistently remaining one of the highest activity producers on his shift. Corporal Garrow is highly respected by other officers and citizens

alike and his initiative, leadership, dependability, dedication and attitude are an inspiration.

Supervisor of the Year

In 2011, **Lieutenant Leland Strickland** supervised the Homeland Security Special Events Unit, planning and managing over 150 major and minor events. Handling his assignments with poise and professionalism, his actions have had a significant impact improving Department-wide operations. He has been a leader in developing and maintaining relationships with other law enforcement agencies.

The largest of the events Lieutenant Strickland managed while serving as the Commander for Homeland Security Special Events Units was Super Bowl XLV. Many people were involved in the planning, but Lieutenant Strickland was responsible for any issues related to unforeseen events, such as weather or protests, and ensured the high level of security was never compromised. Event management of the public safety compound and other aspects began well in advance of Super Bowl Sunday. His skill and dedication ensured that media coverage did not revolve around security lapses or concerns, thus

enhancing the Department's stature both internally and externally. Lieutenant Strickland was also responsible for planning over a hundred large events including three World Series games, the Cotton Bowl, multiple regular season football and baseball games, college football games, concerts and more.

Lieutenant Strickland constantly looks for ways to improve his operations and the service his unit provides to the Department. His use of Microsoft SharePoint and other software to improve efficiency has set the standard for the rest of the Department. As a result of these improvements, Lieutenant Strickland's vision for the off-duty staffing process was recognized with the 2011 Best in Texas Award for Innovation.

- The department's branding committee led by Lieutenant Chad Gann received a first place honor from the 2011 International Police Vehicle Design contest.
- The Crime Prevention Unit led Arlington to achieve its highest National Night Out Award, ranking sixth in the nation for cities over 300,000 population for excellence and high participation levels.
- The Online Police Museum was created.
- Applications Developer Matthew Loughran was honored with a 2011 Best in Texas Award from the Center for Digital Government for his Off-Duty Scheduling System Application, used for complex scheduling tasks during major events at the Stadium and the Ballpark.
- Officer Tyler Farrell was awarded the Certificate of Merit from the International Association of Auto Theft Investigators for his work in the highly successful COBRA Task Force bait car program.
- Deputy Chief Lauretta Hill was the recipient of the 2011 Outstanding African-American Alumni Award by the University of Texas at Arlington African-American Alumni Chapter.
- Officer Jillian M. Smith was awarded the Medal of Valor (posthumously) from both the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education (TCLEOSE) and the International Association of Women Police (IAWP).
