On one center stage, some of Arlington's hardest working police officers shared the spotlight with the community during an afternoon of awards and special honors.

The Awards Ceremony was presented by the Arlington Police Foundation and the family of John V. and Jerri McMillan. A host of area businesses also contributed, helping to honor excellence.

The Arlington Baptist College was bestowed the 2016 Business Partnership Award for their role in a large-scale training exercise with first responders that tested the region's readiness for disaster recovery. 
Before an audience of close to 700 guests, Police Chief Will Johnson thanked the Arlington Police Department and community for another great year of accomplishments.
